



A Message from Our Pastor

Manito Church Family,

Like many of you I am encouraged by both the CDC's recent announcement and the recent release of the "A new framework for our Greater Northwest Area approach to COVID-19."

The Spiritual Administrative Team (SALT) has been working hard to develop a safe reopening plan that meets the guidelines required by our new framework as well as Washington State's "Religious and Faith-based Organization COVID-19 Requirements." **Manito UMC will return to in person Worship on Sunday, July 4th.** Masks will be required as



well as physical distancing between households and in the early stages of our reopening there will be no live singing or communion. We remain hopeful that we will be able to ease the restrictions around singing and communion in the coming months. SALT will be sending out an all-church mailing with more details regarding in-person worship in the coming weeks. Manito will also continue to offer our weekly worship services online. We understand that an inperson worship option may not be possible for all of our church family at this time.

Throughout the pandemic we have sought to: "Do No Harm: Protect the public health, Do Good: Share the financial burden with persons most vulnerable to economic impacts, Stay in Love with God: Promote the life-giving ministries of the Church" (Bishop Elaine JW Stanovsky) and we will continue to move forward with that in mind. We Are Invited to "Gather" - New Design Welcomes Visitors



If you have recently been through our entrance on 33rd street, you may have noticed the new design above the stairs to the Fellowship Hall that are appropriate to our hopeful future together. Many thanks to Wendy Budge, the designer and painter! Here are a few words on the creation of this design.

"I designed this graphic for the church entryway based on a theme suggested by Pat Nash..." Gather". The sheaf of wheat surrounded by the symbol of the Trinity represents Christ (the body of Christ). The stalks of wheat encircling the graphic symbolize Christ, but also represent the wheat growing region we live in."

Office Hours and Access

Manito UMC is currently in Phase 2 of the Greater Northwest Area of The United Methodist Church's plan for reopening. The church staff has returned to the office, and continues to monitor phone calls and email daily . In addition, the exterior doors and office are open Monday-Friday from 10:00am to 2:00pm.

Please note: Anyone entering the church must wear a mask or face covering while in the building and practice physical/social distancing. Groups are limited to five people or fewer and must receive prior approval from the church office.



Finance Committee Report

2021 Annual Operating Budget: \$255,089

Year to date Thru April 30th 2021

Income \$89,937 Budget \$68,576 Total +\$21,361

Fortunately, Manito has continued to stay strong financially during these trying times. Our actual income if you were to look at the profit and loss statement is \$31,755 higher than my reported number. This is due money that we took out of the foundations Centennial fund to pay for the many projects we currently have going on in the church to both give it a fresh feeling and to make it safer.

We did receive great news that our PPP loan of \$24,003 under the CARES Act was forgiven and those numbers will be reflected in our May or June financial statements depending on timing. Thanks to both Liz West and Greg Plummer for all of their hard work on this.

At the end of April, we have \$43,085.12 of cash on hand. However, there are a lot of projects that are going on in the church and much of these funds will be utilized to help fund these projects. On the good side, this does not reflect the \$24,003 from the PPP loan that is being utilized in this year's budget.

The 3 accounts we have with the United Methodist Foundation continue to do outstanding. They are as follows.

- Maintenance Endowment=\$157,118
- Centennial=\$9,003
- Parsonage=\$205,654

Please continue to support Manito through your tithes and gifts. Checks can be mailed to the office; or you may also choose to give through the Donate tab on Manito's website which will allow you to use a bank account or credit/debit card. Also, giving can be done directly from your financial institution to Manito. I personally have started using the VANCO app on my phone to do this and it is extremely convenient and easy. If you would like help setting this up, please make outreach to me.

The Finance Committee is back in person. We will be meeting on the second Tuesday of the month at noon in the memorial lounge. members and friends of Manito are invited to participate. Contact Chris Bafus at 509-994-5392 if you would like to attend.
